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Students Win Highest Honors in WordMasters Challenge

FALLS CHURCH – A team of students representing the Congressional Schools of Virginia recently won highest honors in the WordMasters Challenge – a national language arts competition entered by over 230,000 students annually, which consists of three separate meets held at intervals during the school year.

Competing in the difficult Blue Division of the Challenge, the school's seventh graders tied for fifth place in the nation in the year's second meet, held in February, among 301 school teams participating at this grade level and in this division. The team was coached in preparation for the Challenge by Suzanne Burns.

One of the school's students won highest honors for individual achievement as well: Seventh grader Jordan McDanel earned a perfect score in the meet, where nationwide only 66 seventh graders did so.

The WordMasters Challenge is an exercise in critical thinking, which first encourages students to become familiar with a set of interesting new words (considerably harder than grade level), and then challenges them to use those words to complete analogies expressing various kinds of logical relationships. Working to solve the Challenge analogies helps students learn to think both analytically and metaphorically. Though most vocabulary-boosting and analogy-solving activities have been created for high school students, the WordMasters materials have been specifically designed for younger students, in grades three through eight. They are particularly well suited for able and interested children, who rise to the challenge of learning new words and enjoy the logical puzzles posed by analogies.

The Congressional Schools of Virginia is located on Sleepy Hollow Road in Falls Church, VA.
